MARCH 3, 2020 MEETING MINUTES

President, Greg Jones, called the meeting to order.

Under introduction of (potential) new members, Greg reported that Josh and Linda Porte-Erhard have contacted the club and will be relocating to Aiken from New York state with their 1930 Fordor.

For "show & tell" Jim McPherson discussed how the Model A was advertised as the "New Ford!" But it wasn't necessarily as technically advanced as its competition. Ford was looking for an affordable, but fancier car. While many competitors' vehicles had silver plating Ford was looking for an alternative. The term "Butler Finish" arose from finish on silver flatware and dinnerware that had been polished over and over and had warm, rich appearance. Ford was looking for that look without the need for polishing, which would drive up the cost of production as well as require more maintenance. Ford came up with chromed items that had this same Butler Finish also known as Butler Chrome. It was used on many of the Model A's interior features such as the gear shift and the emergency brake handle (only below the grip). Jim passed around a beautiful example of each. As a side note. Jim also pointed out the replacement gear shifts on the market today are actually formed out of two pieces that are bolted together just below the dome at the base of the shift. He has known of instances where the gear shift has broken at that coupling.

After that excellent "show & tell" Greg Jones noted that Aiken Model A's need to have a tech session on metal finishes.

The minutes from the February meeting were approved with a correction to a date published in the newsletter.

Greg explained the flawed design of the current reproduction bearings. He also noted that several Model A experts recommend using old needle bearings salvaged from used transmission. One source of those bearings is Bert's Model A's out of Colorado.

The meeting was adjourned.



Wheels can be thrown out of balance by a buildup of wheel ants. Protect your car's smooth ride with weekly applications of automotive grade insecticide.








SECURING RADIATOR ORNAMENTS

If a quail or other permanent base, flip-top radiator ornament fits loosely or is chipped, it may come off too easily. This procedure will remedy the situation and make the ornament solid - removable only with an Allen wrench. My quail used to fit so loosely that I removed it whenever I left the Ford unattended. Remove the brass lugs on the bottom of your cap. These are usually held on with Allen head screws. See figure A. Cut a piece of metal bar with the same width as the removed lugs. The bar should be about the same thickness as the lugs. The length of the bar should be as long as possible within the diameter of the radiator neck under the flange. Test the cut bar for fit. It should have about 3/16" play on the ends. Drill and tap the bar to accommodate the Allen head screws. See Figure B. Some of the material may have to be removed from the area of the lugs on the cap base. If so, file very carefully and remove only the necessary material for the bar to fit snugly. Notch the radiator neck flange with a small file (or a broken round file chucked in an electric drill) where the new bar will be when the cap is in place. File and fit until this notch is as deep as practical for your cap. See Figure C.

With the new locking bar loosely attached, put the cap on and tighten the

Allen head screws. As the screws are tightened, the bar will be pulled up into the notches, holding the base firmly. The bar does cover part of the radiator opening, but it doesn't keep you from checking the coolant level nor does it interfere with the overflow tube.






Many Model A owners experience excessive oil leaks when driving their car, often out the rear main seal. One simple thing that can cause this is a restriction in the oil filler pipe. Take the cap off and look down the pipe with a good light. You should only see a series of little metal baffles, half-moon in shape, inside the filler pipe. If you find where someone has covered the pipe with a sock, or stuffed a piece of cloth down in the filler pipe to stop oil from coming out the filler when driving, this will put pressure inside the crankcase and force oil out the rear main seal while you drive. Easy to fix: get that stuff out of there!

While you have it off, also inspect the inside of the oil filler cap. It, too, needs to be clear inside. No pieces of steel wool, pot scrubber, or old sock in the cap! Look for evidence of someone accidentally pushing the oil filler cap on too far. When you do, you bend the little tabs inside the cap and mash it all the way down on the pipe. This blocks the engine's ability to vent the crankcase, builds up pressure, and causes a bad leak out the rear main seal.

I hope this little tip helps you stop that oil leak while driving. Have a Model A Day! lim

USE CAR'S EXHAUST TO CLEAN CUSHIONS




Using the exhaust gas of the automobile to clean the upholstery is the accomplishment of a recently invented device. An aluminum attachment is fastened to the exhaust pipe and the engine is allowed to idle. As the exhaust gas passes through this device suction is created at the inlet hole. Collected by a

nozzle, the dust and dirt are drawn through the hose and expelled into the air at the rear of the car. It is made in three models, for cars of different size.


