October 18 & 19 – Charlotte Auto Fair Display December 13 & 14 – Sage Valley Currier & Ives Christmas


During the initial part of the meeting the officer nominating committee, represented by Dotti Shogren counted the officer ballots. The following results were announced:




The Aiken Model A's extend sincere condolences to our member Craig McMullin. Craig's mom passed away June 3 in Springfield, Massachusetts

"What an awesome experience to drive the 1930 Ford Model A Fordor from Aiken to Trenton and "cruise" in the 2019 Ridge Peach Festival".




MAFFI Newsletter Minute

ROAD TRIP: PENNSYLVANIA

Suggestion: While in the Keystone State, visit the FLIGHT 93 MEMORIAL, then take a trip east on the "Lincoln Highway" (Route 30) to see this barn art (with Model A's!) and much more.



In the early 1900s, automobiles were mostly playthings for the wealthy and roads were often nothing more than twin ruts through the mud. In 1912, Carl Fischer, owner of the brick-paved

Indianapolis Speedway, conceived a grand idea: the first transcontinental crushed rock highway. His partner, Henry Joy, came up with the idea of naming the road after Abraham Lincoln. Connecting Times Square in New York City to San Francisco's Lincoln Park, the 1915 route took early motorists on a coast-to-coast adventure of over 3,300 miles over <u>unimproved</u> roads (*a road was "improved" if it had been graded and perhaps even had a gravel covering*) through 14 states.

In south-central Pennsylvania, the Lincoln Highway Heritage Corridor is marked by red, white and blue road signs containing a large letter "L" and has exhibits, murals and vintage gas pumps along its historic route. The two larger-than-life barn murals I'm sharing here pay tribute to our 16th president, the vehicles and people that ventured this way in the early decades of the last century. There's a Lincoln Highway Experience Museum in Latrobe, PA—it's 'for anyone traveling American's first coast to coast road.'



FLIGHT 93 NATIONAL MEMORIAL

On the morning of September 11,2001 the US came under attack when four commercial airliners were hijacked and used as guided bombs to strike targets on the

ground. Nearly 3,000 people tragically lost their lives.

Because of the actions of the 40 passengers and crew aboard one of the planes, Flight 93, the terrorists never made it to Washington. Passengers struggled to thwart the hijacking and the plane crashed into a field just west of Bedford County. In this field, a monument has been raised to honor the passengers and crew of United Airlines Flight 93. There's a memorial and visitor center, completed just recently; its address is 6424 Lincoln Highway, Stoystown, PA, about 8.5 miles east of the Rte 30/219 intersection.



Known locally as the "Abraham Lincoln Barn", it's located in **Somerset County** near the J of Routes 30 and 219. The first woman to drive the Lincoln Highway from San Francisco to New York, Amanda Preuss, is depicted in her 1916 Oldsmobile V-8 Roadster—it took her 11 days, 5 hours and 45 minutes to make the trip. She was arrested for hitting a horse in Wyoming (she literally ran over it, reporting *'I hit it with a crash, bowling it over, and before it had a chance to recover, rolled upon it with the front wheels of my car. There I hung, with the neighing, kicking horse beneath me') but she set a women's transcontinental speed record. Also pictured is Henry Ford with his first (Quadricycle) and ten-millionth Fords.*



This is another nostalgic barn mural commissioned by the Lincoln Highway Heritage Corridor and painted by artist Wayne Fettro—this one is to the east in **Bedford County**. This gem, with its three-sided mural, can be found right along U.S. Route 30 near Schellsburg, PA; the barn is part of the Bison Corral farm.

Note: Tom and I have seen both of these barns, but it was in 2009. I recently wrote to both Somerset and Bedford Counties inquiring about the barns' current conditions—Bedford Co. replied.. 'After heading up and down the mountain, you'll see a herd of bison, as well as a 'gently worn' mural on the barn. Across the street is the Bison Gift Shop, and site of another painted pump and interpretive exhibit.

The **PACKING FOR TRAVELING** Model A C Years:

In an article for the MAFCA website in August 2013, Mary Carlson writes: 'I've recently found an ad for luggage that would have been perfect for travelling during the Model A era. These 'wardrolas' were cleverly designed to hold a multitude of outfits.

The Wheary Trunk Company of Racine, Wisconsin stated that the trunks came in colors such as gold, green, burnt orange and maroon. The ad indicated that the trunks were perfect for air travel, train travel, steamship travel and also for automobile travel. The Airplane Wardrolette was sized to fit on the running board of a car. It would hold 10 dresses, 3 pairs of shoes and 42 other garments!

Don't you wish you had one of these nifty trunks?'





TINY TIPS



OIL PUMP SPRING

Over the years I have seen altogether too many Model A engines with a bolt in the hole at the oil pump. These bolts were presumably installed not only to prevent oil loss but also to hold the oil pump in place - this is wrong! This hole has a 1/8" N.P.T. thread not a machine thread. The hole was originally fitted with a short 1/4" pipe plug with a screwdriver slot, much the same as the one supplied with some intake manifolds.




There is a 3/8" N.F. set screw and lock nut in the side of the head to lock the distributor in place. Don't confuse the two situations.

The oil pump is to be held in place with a spring attached to the pump or in early models with the spring attached to the pan. The only situation tolerating a 3/8" N.F. bolt in the side of the block would be to hold the oil pump in place when installing the pan.

The bolt must be removed before starting the engine and replaced with the proper pipe plug. Failure to do this can cause the oil pump body to break.

The 1/4" pipe hole was put there to test the pump or to install fittings for an accessory oil pressure gauge.





Jim's Tech Tip Installing the Horn Rod

When installing the small C-clip on the end of the horn rod, use an old wooden yardstick or something similar up at the steering wheel end to hold the horn button down. Slip the yardstick under the wheel on one side, go over the horn button, then gently flex the yardstick and slip the end under the steering wheel on the opposite side. The yardstick will hold the rod down while you work at the other end, pushing up on the spider against the spring, and inserting the C-clip keeper.


