As a result of no member offering to run as well as the current COVID-19 situation, the Board decided that the current slate of officers would run on the ballot. It was decided that we would do electronic voting (by email).

In mid-May, an email was sent to all AMA members, informing them that the current slate of officers had agreed to stand for re-election. If the member agreed, all they had to do is respond to this email with a "yes" (meaning they were voting <u>for</u> the current slate of officers) or "no", (meaning they were voting <u>against</u> the current slate of officers). A response was requested by Friday, May 22, and I agreed to tally the vote.

Nearly 2/3 of our membership responded, each with a "yes" vote. Therefore, the current slate of officers (see upper left corner, this page) will continue into 2021.




Phone Cradle for Your Model A By J. Robert Howard, Round Rock TX Tiny Tip from The Restorer, Sept/Oct 2019

Especially since the time I was the last car in the tour group and missed a turn, I've been looking for a way to use my cell phone as my navigation system in my Model A. I tried a magnetic mount and a suction mount, but they kept falling off. So, here's my solution to mounting a device that can tell you where you are—and what to do if you miss a turn.

• Take one of those scraps of wood you didn't throw away and cut a block 2-1/2" x 5-1/4" x 3/4".



- On one side, cut a slot 1" deep. On the other side, cut it 1/8" deep.
- The slot should be about 1/4" wide to fit your lip. (Cutting it 1/32" less for the shallow slot and 1/32" more for the deep slot worked for me.)
- In the top, cut a slot about 3/8" to match the thickness of your phone. (My phone has a soft case, and the slot was not sanded. When it's in place, it doesn't move.)
- When you slip the deep slot into the dashboard, you should be able to close your windshield.
- When you use the shallow slot, you should be able to use the notch in your windshield swing arms.
- Paint it black, your dashboard color, or your windshield frame color, and you're ready for the road.




Serendipity?

It happens sometimes. You learn something one day, and sooner or later it comes full circle! This is a tale of Michigan. gliders, Model As and Aiken's First Presbyterian Church.

In the early 2000s, Tom and I took a trip through Michigan's Upper Peninsula. Henry Ford's name kept popping up everywhere—so in the Kingsford area we visited one of his facilities. We saw a film on the development of the CG-4A cargo glider during WWII. Ford was not the only manufacturer, but he was the largest.

Since the early 1920s Iron Mountain/Kingsford had been producing wooden auto parts, station wagon bodies, chemicals, and charcoal (Kingsford-what else?) It was the area's largest employer. and it had been closed early in the war after being classified as a 'producer of products nonessential to the war effort'.



Early in 1942. however, the government asked Ford to build 1,000 15-seat cargo gliders, so that summer the plant was reactivated.

COOKERY TIPS:

- Triple-wrap food packages with tin foil
- Use enough liquids to cook food
- Secure with hay wire to the exhaust manifold
- Check cooking times with some stops and sample
- Manifold gets very hot so wear gloves or use pot holders

Renovations took place and new machinerv was installed. New drying and gluing machines were invented to enable the daily production of 8 gliders by the 4,500 workers working three shifts.



In the next 3 years, a total of 4,205 15-seat gliders were produced by the Kingsford plant. They were crated and shipped via railroad-each filled 5 crates loaded on 3 flatcars-then they were shipped overseas. (In addition, the company produced 87 huge CVG-13A gliders, redesigned by Ford to carry 42 armed soldiers.)

Ford gliders were used in the invasions of Sicily and Normandy, as Allied planes towed the giant streamlined gliders (3,750#, 48' long, 121/2' high) from which troops successfully dropped behind enemy lines.

Fast-forward 60+ years. On September 11, 2007, we took our three Model A's to church, where Tom had been asked to present a program on his hobby. (see photo, above) He mentioned Fordlandia and gliders.

In the audience was Curt Davis. It's a small world, indeed, for one of Curt's assignments while stationed in England during WWII was.....opening those crates and assembling those Ford gliders! He was so excited to hear 'the rest of the story'!

Manifold Cookery

Interstate 20 Chicken Wings (Distance: 150-210 miles)

- 18 chicken wings
- 1/2 c catsup
- 1 c red wine vinegar

- 4 to 6 jalapeno peppers (more for really hot)
- 3 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 T oregano
- 1 tsp red pepper flakes Salt (to taste)
- At home, place chicken wings in a bowl. Blend the remaining ingredients in a second bowl and then pour over the wings. Cover tightly and refrigerate 24 hours, stirring occasionally. Drain wings, retaining marinade liquid, and divide them among three sheets of foil. Brush with remaining marinade. Cook from Aiken to Atlanta. Total cooking time will be about 2 1/2 hours. If they aren't done

at Atlanta, check them again at the Alabama state line!
